Part 2:

Course Description/Rationale:

Advanced Studies in Painting is designed to familiarize the student with the process of planning and executing long-term independent-progress painting projects of the students' choosing.

Class Format: Class will be an open study course that focuses on close working ties between student and professor to establish a goal and the plan to accomplish it. Independent work habits and time maintenance skills are required for the student to implement his or his plan for their artwork.

Course Goals:

- To instill in the student the importance of independent artistic rigor and professional development
- To build confidence in the student with regards to their personal artistic vision and abilities
- To develop, edit, and discuss a professional-grade portfolio of work related to painting, painting processes, and painting theory

Learning Outcomes:

- Students will know the process of independently developing a strong body of work
- Students will be able to articulately discuss their work and working process
- Students will learn the basic fundamentals of artistic philosophies and principles as they relate to the history of painting and the contemporary application of art theory.
- Students will learn how to plan and execute works of art in the diverse media of painting.
- Students will be introduced to historical and contemporary art pieces and artists who are engaged in the process of painting.
- Students will become familiarized with painting-related language and practices.

-Students will learn to express how they critically think about art pieces they create.

-Students will learn to discuss diverse artistic ideas and philosophies constructively and critically.

PLEASE NOTE: This class looks at a diverse range of art without censorship. There may be times we look at work or express opinions that make you uncomfortable. That is understandable, however, utmost respect is expected for every student and the professor.

There may be times we look at work with nudity, an array of religious themes (both pro- and con-), violence, and with diverse racial, gender, and sexuality views. Please conduct yourself maturely. You do not have to agree, but you are expected to disagree articulately and with respect.

Course Requirements:

A grade of a C or better is required for credit for art majors.

Course Activities:

Grading will be determined by a minimum of four (4) completed works of art in the painting genre, created in long-term form. Students will also be assessed on their work rigor and process, their ability to articulate their ideas and progress, and their ability to defend their artwork in critique.

Deadlines: You are responsible for meeting all deadlines.
