Course Description/Rationale:

This course will explore the theory and practice of sport organizations and their governance structure, functions, and membership requirements. The rules and regulations of each sport governing body, current issues and trends for each governing body including: high school athletics, intercollegiate athletics, state, national, and international organization.
